## Local COVID-19 alert level: Very High (Tier 3) from 31<sup>st</sup> December 2020

The number of people testing positive for COVID-19 continues to increase in Wirral.

There is still widespread community transmission, with new positive COVID-19 cases being seen each day across Wirral and in all age groups.

The current level of **760 cases per week (in the 7 days to 26<sup>th</sup> December 2020**, the most recent day for which figures are available).

The latest weekly rate of **COVID-19 in Wirral is 214 per 100,000 population** while the **latest positivity rate is 7.8%** (percentage of positive tests of all tests carried out in the last 7 days).


By 10-year age band, the largest percentage number of cases in the **7-days to 26/12/2020 were in those aged those aged 30-39 (18.5%), followed by those aged 50-59 (17.5%), aged 40-49 (17.5%) and 20-29 (17.5%).** Almost three-quarters of cases in this week were in these age bands (see table below).

There were slightly more cases in women compared to men in the **7-days to 26/12/2020**; **52.5% female**, **47% male and 0.5% unknown**.

The wards with the largest number of confirmed cases (in the 7-days to 26/12/2020) were Moreton West and Saughall Massie (56), Bebington (50) and Bromborough (47) (see table below).

The ethnicity of confirmed cases (in the 7-days to 26/12/2020) was 81.5% White British, 13% unknown and 5.5% from BAME and/or mixed heritage backgrounds.

Weekly data from ONS (published on 29/12/2020) showed there had been 84 registered deaths in Wirral, of which 9.5% (or 8 in actual numbers) were COVID-19 deaths.



## To protect yourself and others, you must:

- Wash your hands with soap and water often, and as soon as you get home. Use hand sanitiser gel if soap and water is not available
- Stay at least 2 metres away from anyone you do not live with, or who is not in your support bubble
- Wear a face covering over your mouth and nose where social distancing is not possible outdoors and indoors.
