Local COVID-19 alert level: High (Tier 2)

The number of people testing positive for COVID-19 is once again increasing in Wirral.

There is still widespread community transmission, with new positive COVID-19 cases being seen each day across Wirral and in all age groups.

The current level of **711 cases per week (in the 7 days to 24th December 2020**, the most recent day for which figures are available).

The latest weekly rate of **COVID-19** in **Wirral** is **210** per **100,000** population while the **latest positivity** rate is **7%** (percentage of positive tests of all tests carried out in the last 7 days).


By 10-year age band, the largest percentage number of cases in the **7-days to 24/12/2020 were in those** aged those aged 30-39 (20%), followed by those aged 20-29 (18%), aged 40-49 (18%) and 50-59 (16%). Almost three-quarters of cases in this week were in these age bands (see table below).

There were slightly more cases in women compared to men in the **7-days to 24/12/2020**; **52% female**, **47% male and 1% unknown**.

The wards with the largest number of confirmed cases (in the 7-days to 24/12/2020) were Bromborough (51), Bebington (50) and Moreton West and Saughall Massie (47) (see table below).

The ethnicity of confirmed cases (in the 7-days to 24/12/2020) was 82% White British, 11% unknown and 7% from BAME and/or mixed heritage backgrounds.

Weekly data from ONS (published on 22/12/2020) showed there had been 79 registered deaths in Wirral, of which 10% (or 8 in actual numbers) were COVID-19 deaths (will be updated on 30/12/20).



To protect yourself and others, you must:

- Wash your hands with soap and water often, and as soon as you get home. Use hand sanitiser gel if soap and water is not available
- Stay at least 2 metres away from anyone you do not live with, or who is not in your support bubble

 support bubble must also stay at home until you get your result.
